County Lines – Behaviours & Traits

Are you concerned your child or someone you know may be involved in County Lines?

What is County Lines?

County Lines is the term used to described gangs and organized criminal activity. Particularly around the transporting of drugs around the UK. County lines tends to exploit young people and vulnerable adults, to carry drugs, money and weapons, by means of violence and intimidation.

Here are some things to look out for:

- The Young Person is withdrawn from their family
- The Young Person loses interest in school.
- Their attendance drops. Although some will continue to go to school and keep good attendance to avoid suspicion
- He/She will have multiple phones
- He/She might start speaking aggressively about another group of young people
- He/She might be afraid or wary when entering certain areas
- He/She may show concern when an unknown group of people enter their area

- Emotionally withdrawn and "switched off" but can also show frustration and rage
- He/She will start to use slang you haven't heard before
- He/She have unexplained money, phones and other possessions
- Staying out later than usual and breaking rules set by parents (more than the average young person would)
- Start dressing differently, or in a particular style/uniform/colours, similar to that of the group of young people they hang out with
- Stop doing activities such as sports and other positive activities
- They have a new nickname
- They may come home with injuries and not want to explain how or why they got them and refuse treatment
- He/She will start associating with known or suspected gang members
- Their behaviour changes and they adapt a certain way of talking or even hand signs in pictures
- Their schoolbooks and bags or even walls will carry a certain 'tag' in graffiti style
- They will talk a lot about another young person who is clearly having a lot of influence over them
- They start hanging out with a new group of people and stop speaking to old friends

Who can it affect?

- Any child or young person (male or female) under the age of 18 years
- Vulnerable adult over the age of 18 years


How can it affects those involved

Force and/or enticement-based methods of compliance and is often accompanied by violence or threats of violence.

Mental Health

Witnessing repeated traumatic events, can evoke feelings of anger and fear, that not only lead to physical complications, but mental health conditions. Being constantly exposed to such disturbing things, whether it's first-hand or second hand, will affect their mental health.


RISK FACTORS CONTRIBUTING TO MENTAL HEALTH




HOW ARE PEOPLE RECRUITED

6 REASONS WHY GANGS USE YOUNG PEOPLE

- Clean skin No previous convictions
- Reduced sentence from courts
- Cost to 'employ' is lower
- Disposable
- Attract less attention
- Easier to groom and maintain control Debt bondage -Fear/ threats/ violence - Don't see themselves as victims
 - They think it gives them Status and Respect.

RISK TO YOUNG PEOPLE



Child Criminal Exploitation... Occurs where an individual or group takes advantage of an imbalance of power to coerce, control, manipulate or deceive a **child** or young person under the age of 18. The victim may have been criminally **exploited** even if the activity appears consensual.
